REFLECTIONS ON THE LEGACIES OF AL-ANON

*Recovery through the Twelve Steps, Unity through the Twelve Traditions,
Service through the Twelve Concepts of Service*

Step 6: *Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.*

Before I can truly take Step Six, I must fully accept and embrace Step Three: “Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.” Step Three reminds me that recovery and spiritual growth are not about controlling everything myself. They are about surrender, trust, and faith. When I place my will and my life into God’s hands, I begin to understand that I do not have to carry every burden alone. Step Six builds upon that decision by asking me to trust God enough to let go of the defects that keep me spiritually stuck and separated from the person He is calling me to become.

This Step is truly a lesson in willingness. It teaches me that change does not happen through force, shame, or perfection, but through humility, honesty, patience, and trust in God’s care. I begin to see my life opening up in new directions. Old fears, resentments, and habits slowly lose their grip as I become more willing to surrender them. I may not always know exactly how God will work in my life, but I can trust that He is guiding me toward healing and spiritual growth.

Step Six gives me the opportunity to cooperate with God instead of resisting Him. My responsibility is not to fix myself completely, but to become willing — willing to let go of my faults, willing to change, and willing to allow God to do what I cannot do alone. My goal is to prepare my heart, open my mind, and trust God to take care of the rest.

Finally, an important part of my Sixth Step work is practicing gratitude. The more I give thanks for my life as it is today, the more I begin to accept the healing that God offers me. Gratitude helps me focus less on my shortcomings and more on the blessings, strengths, and opportunities for growth that are already present in my life. As I recognize and cultivate the abilities God has given me, I become increasingly willing to let go of the defects, attitudes, and behaviors that no longer serve me or others.

It has always been hard for me to admit that I am wrong, even now, despite the awareness gained after many years in our Program. It wasn't that I unreasonably insisted on being right under any circumstances, but thanks to decades of living with active alcoholism and the "isms" that went along with it, I suffered from so much fear, worry and anxiety that the illusion of control that I believed I had, was the only thing allowing me to hold myself together and navigate life. I truly felt that my solutions and opinions were the correct ones in nearly every situation I faced. The idea of trusting and delegating was completely foreign to me, even though I began to realize that believing I was the only one who had the answers was an exhausting and frustrating way to live. I needed to learn many lessons in Al-Anon and one of my most valuable came from learning to trust again, and this trust in and reliance on a Power greater than myself, allowed me a new lease on life.

Even though our Concepts are designed to help Al-Anon run in a cohesive, diplomatic manner, as stated on page XIII of the Intro in Paths to Recovery: "The Concepts help us extend all that we learn to the World at large – our families, jobs, organizations and communities." the value in this is enormous! Study and practice of Concept 6 is helping me to relinquish my crazy sense of control that I clung so tightly to for most of my life. It introduced me to some new ideas – trust, respect and delegation and the peace, calm and serenity that awaits me when I put this Concept to work in my life is something I'll forever be grateful for.

MY DISEASE

Before Al-Anon, I knew little outside of grief. My relationship with the addicted members of my family had transformed from frustration to obsession. Without realizing it, I had built a prison in my mind, where I was convinced that I was trapped and nothing would ever change.

My mother, who has been in the program for 30 years, listened to me complain, even as it ate into our time together. Finally, she said, “You sound like an addict.” Only then did I see how my addiction to control, judgment, self-pity, anger, and dependence mimicked the signs of addiction to alcohol.

I found a meeting and have been going ever since. From the start, I knew it was where I needed to be. Without Al-Anon, my life would be terrible and completely unmanageable. Today I am someone who shares regularly in meetings and sponsors others. I now carry a sense of calm I haven’t felt in decades!
